Emma's Obituary

Emma Maltby (neé Rawson) was, quite simply, an 'expression of God's Love'. This was one of the many tributes paid to Emma, who died of cancer on Wednesday, 14th May 2003, aged 38.

Emma led a remarkable life. Born in Kirk Deighton on June 14, 1964; Emma was to become a deeply spiritual person. Her belief in Christianity began when she attended The Mount School - a quaker institution; however, the impact of her father's death at a young age secured her faith and defined her life.

It wasn't until she graduated with a first class degree in Comparative Religion at King's College in London that she realised her true potential and began to pursue a career in the local ministry.

Working alongside the Gloucester diocese, where one of her roles was to be the school visitor to the Bishop, she became a much-loved figure in the local community. This involved taking children's assembly at the village school, working closely with other parents in training of parenting skills and practising local ministry in the communities on and around May Hill, her adopted home in Gloucester. As well as working she continued with her studies and as part of her Theology degree at the former Cheltenham and Gloucester College of higher education, she wrote her thesis on 'Children and Bereavement', which later inspired her to become deeply involved in a local charity Winston's Wish, which specializes in this field.



Emma sailed through any academic challenge, whereas every day life was not so simple, and clearly religion helped to answer those questions that she could not answer herself.

She was an inspiration to so many people and touched the lives of everyone she met. She was a wonderful mother to Louis and Amelia, a devoted wife to Al and a loving sister to Jane and a gracious daughter to Wendy. Lastly, the Reverend Leslie Holden, who confirmed Emma said, 'Emma was so beautiful in every way, with her lovely poise, of mind, as well as her manner, and in her attitudes and thinking. She was so purely intentioned and in seeking good'.

Emma cherished her beloved family and friendships and this was to be her parting gift to us and in return we must keep her close.
